Introduction

England has had a king or a queen for more than 1,000 years. For hundreds of years, the king or queen was very important to the people of Britain. They ruled the country and they decided things that changed people's lives. They started fights with other countries. They made laws. Sometimes they chose the religion that people had to follow.

Today the role of the British Royal Family is very different. Queen Elizabeth II has no political power. The British Parliament decides the laws today. The Queen is only a symbolic head of the country. But she has many traditional duties and she works with a lot of charities. She is still important for the British people and most of them are very proud of their Royal Family. The Queen is also famous around the world. People from many countries watch royal celebrations on TV and every year thousands of tourists visit palaces and other royal buildings.

Queen Elizabeth has been Britain's monarch for more than sixty years. But today the world is a very different place and a lot of things have happened to the Royal Family in that time. Is the monarchy still changing? Let's see ...



CHAPTER 1 The Queen: a life of duty



The 2012 Olympic opening ceremony is about to begin. Queen Elizabeth II walks through Buckingham Palace with James Bond. Outside a helicopter is waiting for them.

Minutes later, 80,000 people look up into the evening sky. They see a woman with a parachute jumping from a helicopter! Then James Bond jumps too ...

When the 2012 Olympics opened in London, this short film was part of the opening ceremony. Of course, the Queen didn't really arrive by parachute but she showed the world that the British queen enjoys a joke! The role of the monarch has clearly changed a lot since Elizabeth became queen at twenty-six years old.



In 1952, Princess Elizabeth was in Kenya with her husband, Prince Philip. Princess Elizabeth's father, King George VI, was ill. In his place, Princess Elizabeth was visiting several countries in the Commonwealth*. But she had to stop and return quickly to London. King George died suddenly

and now Elizabeth was Queen of England. It was a very sad time for her but she had to start one of the most difficult jobs in the world.

The young Princess Elizabeth knew that her life was going to change greatly. For the rest of her life she had to put her country first and her family second. She had to do all the duties of the Head of State. And the first big ceremony was her Coronation.

It is the tradition for every new king or queen of Britain to have a coronation ceremony in Westminster Abbey in London. They give promises to the people and take the British crown. It is a very important day for the whole country. In 1953 everyone in the UK and the Commonwealth planned special celebrations. There were parties in the streets and flags on nearly every house. Millions of people came to London to watch the Queen. Many arrived very early and slept in the streets so that they had a good place to watch the processions. And for the first time TV cameras filmed every moment so that millions more people could watch the ceremony in their homes.



They saw Princess Elizabeth ride to Westminster Abbey in a beautiful coach with twelve horses. They saw her go into the Abbey in a long, white dress. And they heard her promise to give the rest of her life to the people of England. It was a big day and a great responsibility for the young woman but she spoke strongly and clearly. For more than sixty years Queen Elizabeth has done exactly what she promised.

In the past the kings and queens of England had a lot of power. Now the Queen can't make political changes. Her role is very symbolic. Some people today think that it is too expensive for the country to have a Royal Family. They say it is not necessary now. They think that the Royal Family live a rich and easy life but they don't pay for it.

Other people believe that the Queen does a very important job. Government changes the laws but the Queen has to sign them all. And there are lots of traditions she has to follow. For example she has to wear special clothes and her crown to open and close Parliament* every year. She has to meet the head of the British government, every week.

Every day Queen Elizabeth has lots of things to do. She has to visit schools, open new museums, go to important shows, meet important foreign visitors and visit a lot of different countries. She gives money and help to many charities too. And all the time she has to smile and be nice to people. It's not always easy!



For sixty years the Queen has done her job well. She has signed more than 3,500 laws. She has answered three and a half million letters! She has been on hundreds of visits to other countries and she has sent more than 175,000 cards to people who reach their hundredth birthday!

During her time as queen the world has changed a lot. Queen Elizabeth has tried to change the way the people think of the Royal Family too. Elizabeth has brought the Royal Family closer to the people. She started this in 1970 in Australia when she did the first 'walkabout'. She walked close up to the people so they could see her and speak to her. Now everyone in the Royal Family does this when they can.

The Queen has done another important thing. She has allowed the people to see more of her own life. People know a lot about the lives of her children, Charles, Anne, Andrew and Edward. Before, people only heard the Queen on the radio when she gave her Christmas message once a year. Later, of course, she did this on television. But during her sixty years as queen there have been many TV films about the life of the Royal Family. In 1969 there was a famous TV show which showed the Royal Family's life at Buckingham Palace. People saw them eat breakfast and talk about everyday things. They saw them taking their dogs for walks. It surprised a lot of people!



People today can also now go inside the Queen's London home – Buckingham Palace. Every summer about 300,000 people visit the palace and see the main rooms and gardens. But they can't see the Queen. She isn't at home! She spends a lot of time away from London

during the summer, though she always returns for her famous summer garden parties!

If you can't visit the Queen in London, you can always visit the Royal Family on your computer! In 1997 the British monarchy started its own website. In 2007 there was a British monarchy YouTube channel and a royal Twitter site and a royal Facebook page appeared in 2010!

The Royal Family has always loved dogs but
Queen Elizabeth's favourites are corgis. These are
small, strong dogs from Wales. A long time ago people used
them to work with animals. Corgis are small but they like fighting
and sometimes they bite the visitors at the palace too!

People say that the Queen hid her favourite pet corgi, Susan, in the royal coach after her wedding in 1947!

CARDEN PARTIES

Every summer the Queen has three garden parties at Buckingham Palace. About 8,000 people come to each one! These parties happen from 4–6pm and people drink tea, eat cakes, walk round the gardens and sometimes meet the Queen.

The people who come are ordinary people with different jobs and lifestyles. The Queen invites them to say 'thank you' for things they have done to help people and the country.

If you meet the Queen, you need to know a lot of rules!

When you meet the Queen, call her 'Your Majesty' first, and after that call her 'Ma'am' – the same sound as 'I am'

If you are British, the women do a small curtsey, the men give a small bow. (You don't have to do this if the Queen is not your monarch.)

Do not put your hand out for a handshake but wait for the Queen to do this.

If the Queen stops eating everyone stops eating too!

And never turn your back on the Queen!

After sixty years as Queen, Elizabeth II continues to work hard. In 2012, people all over the world saw her popularity with the British people during the three days of celebrations for her Diamond Jubilee.

Thousands of people came to London to watch the celebrations. Many people arrived early and slept in the streets to see her go past as they did on Coronation Day in 1953. Many more people had parties in the streets and watched it on television – and this time it was in colour! But unlike 1953 the weather was not kind during the celebration days. Rain fell on the procession of boats down the River Thames, but the Queen enjoyed every minute. At the end of a very busy day when smiling singers sang to her, she smiled back. Elizabeth II was happy. And after sixty successful years as the Queen of England, she was right to be

A family of countries

The Commonwealth is like a big family of countries with links to Britain, Most of the countries were once ruled by Britain, but today sharing ideas and resources is more important. Commonwealth countries want people to have good government, good schools, good jobs and live well. They buy and sell things between them and the richer countries help the poorer countries with money and teaching. Some countries are big, like India: some are small, like Grenada, in the Caribbean. The people in all these countries have different traditions, history and religions. Most also have their own languages, though a lot of people can speak English, too!

- ★ There are 54 countries in the Commonwealth.
- ★ The Commonwealth began in 1949.
- ★ 6 out of 10 people who live in the UK have family in another Commonwealth country.
- ★ There are more than two billion people in the Commonwealth.
- ★ Queen Elizabeth II is Head of State for 16 of the Commonwealth countries, including Australia and Canada.
- ★ Over 50% of the people in the Commonwealth are under 25.



The Commonwealth Games

This is a special sports competition for people from all the different countries in the Commonwealth. It happens every four years in a different Commonwealth country. More than 4,000 people compete. It is the third biggest sports competition in the world!

(The biggest is the Olympics, then the Asian Games.)

In 2014 the Games are in Glasgow, Scotland and in 2018 they move to the Gold Coast, Australia. Does

CHAPTER 2 Trouble at the palace



Princess Diana is probably one of the most famous people in the world. People everywhere, young and old, know her face and her story. They remember the beautiful young princess who married her prince in a wonderful ceremony. But the story has a sad ending. The princess died when she was only thirty-six years old in a terrible car crash. Today there are still questions about why the crash happened. Millions of people watched her funeral. They felt sad for the princess, but also for her two young sons, Princes William and Harry, who now had no mother.

The British people loved Diana, but the young princess did not always agree with Royal Family traditions. Charles and Diana had many problems in their marriage and this was very difficult for the Royal Family.

The Queen wanted the Royal Family to be a good example of family life but this did not always happen. Her own marriage to Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh, was very strong but three of her children, and her sister Margaret, all had broken marriages. But it was Charles' marriage to Diana that was the biggest problem for the Queen and the monarchy.

In the beginning everything seemed perfect. Charles, the future king, met Diana, a shy and beautiful young girl and asked her to marry him. Diana was from a very old and important family, the Spencers. When she was young, she wanted to be a dancer but then she grew too tall. When she became Charles' girlfriend she was working in a school for young children. But people weren't sure that Charles really loved Diana. They spoke on television before they got married and some things Charles said about love were surprising.



Their wedding at St Paul's Cathedral* in London in 1981 was the biggest TV event in history. Diana was popular and she brought new life into the old, traditional Royal Family. She and Charles had two sons, William and Henry, or Harry. But then the problems began.

Charles and Diana were very different. Charles always appeared very quiet but Diana loved dancing and music and clothes. She had lots

of friends who were singers and film stars. She cared about poor and ill people and did a lot of work with charities, especially AIDS* and landmine** charities. People found it easy to talk to her and she was always smiling and laughing with them.



But behind her smiles the young princess was not happy. Diana's friends and supporters say that the problem was Charles. His first love, Camilla, married someone else but Charles never stopped loving her. Diana herself said that there were 'three people' in her marriage. Was this true or not? No one really knows. But Diana became unhappy and started to look for love with different people.

Supporters of Charles say that life was difficult for him because Diana became too popular, too much like a film star. She didn't want to live the same life as other people in the Royal Family, with the same responsibilities. It was clear to everyone that Charles and Diana were very different people and the marriage could not continue.

Finally Diana and Charles divorced. The story was in all the



newspapers and Diana became even more popular. She was now a confident celebrity. Every day people read about her clothes, her work with charities, her new boyfriends and the problems between her, the Queen and the Royal Family. The Queen was not happy. But the rest of the world loved the stories.

Then, on August the 31st, 1997, people everywhere woke up to hear the news that Diana was dead. She and her boyfriend, Dodi Al Faed, were in a car crash in Paris. Both of them died.



In the days after the news the British people showed how much they loved Diana. Many thousands of people brought flowers to put outside her home, Kensington Palace. People waited to hear words from the Queen – but she didn't say anything. She and her family were at their Scottish summer home, Balmoral Castle, and they didn't return to London. The British people were very angry. They wrote messages with the flowers. Some messages said that Diana's death was the Queen's fault. They said that the Royal Family was unkind to Diana before she died.



The Queen had a big problem now. Because Charles and Diana were divorced, Diana was not part of the Royal Family. The law said that she couldn't have the same funeral as a real princess. The British people didn't agree. The Royal Family suddenly became very unpopular and a lot of British people said that they didn't want a monarchy any more. This was a dangerous time for the Queen. In the end, she returned to London. She was very surprised to see all the people and all the flowers outside the palace. She knew that things had to change.

ROYAL HOUSES

Buckingham Palace is not the Royal Family's only home. They use a lot of houses and castles in Britain. Here are three of them.

Kensington Palace

British Royals have lived in this London palace since 1689. Diana, Princess of Wales, lived here until she died in 1997. Now it is the London home of William and Kate, Duke and Duchess of Cambridge.





Windsor Castle

In 1080 William the Conqueror built this castle just outside London. It is the oldest royal home in Britain and it is also the biggest castle in the world where people still live.

Balmoral Castle

Balmoral Castle is in a beautiful part of Scotland and it is the Royal Family's favourite place to spend their summer holiday.



Did the Royal Family really understand the British people's love for Diana? No one really knows, but in the end there was a big funeral for Diana – just like for a real royal princess. Many of the funeral guests were unusual for a royal event. Instead of kings and queens there were a lot of celebrities. A famous singer, Elton John, played and sang a special song for Diana in Westminster Abbey. It was a very sad day. One of the saddest things was the procession behind Diana's body. In front were her two young sons, Prince William and Prince Harry. Their mother's short life changed the Royal Family forever.





Almost eight years after Diana died, in 2005, Charles married Camilla. This was a difficult day for the Queen because some British people didn't like Camilla very much. They still remembered Diana and they thought Charles was unkind to her. They didn't want Camilla to be a future queen. So, it wasn't a big event and the Queen didn't go to the first part of the ceremony. Charles' two sons William and Harry went to the wedding and were happy for their father.

Camilla will never be as popular as Diana but Prince Charles' second marriage seems much stronger. He has known Camilla for a long time and they share a lot of interests. William and Harry will never forget their mother but they support their father and his new wife.



The British monarchy has often had difficult times, but it has also learnt to change. After Diana died, the Queen learnt that the feelings of the British people are very important ... sometimes more important than the long history of royal traditions.



Religion

Henry changed England's religion from Catholic to Protestant because the Pope didn't allow him to divorce his first wife, Catherine. Henry became the head of England's new religion. Then he divorced his wife and kept the church's money in England instead of sending it to the Pope. Henry's new 'Church of England' is still the main religion in Britain today.

Henry was a clever man and he loved books and music. He was tall, good looking and strong and played many sports. Henry also loved good food – a lot! Later in life he became very fat and ill. He died at the age of 56.

CHAPTER 3

The new royals

Elizabeth II is Britain's oldest monarch ever! Now a new generation of young royals is making the monarchy popular with young people all over the world.

Princes William and Harry (his real name is Henry) have a lot to thank their mother Diana for. When the boys were born she wanted their lives to be different from other royal children. Harry



It is a tradition for princes from the Royal Family to train and work in the army. Harry was very happy to do this. He didn't enjoy school very much! It is sometimes difficult for him because he can't always fight with his men. He can't go to very dangerous places because he is an important person in the Royal Family.

Harry also loves sport. He plays a lot of sports himself and he supports Arsenal Football Club. He also does a lot of charity work with young people in Africa, just like his mother did. He goes on royal visits to other countries too.

Harry likes dangerous and exciting activities and has done a lot of unusual things. In 2011 he crossed the Arctic to get to the North Pole with a group of army friends. It was a long way and it was very cold!

William



William worked hard at school and he was a good student. But he wanted to see some more of the world before university. Like many students, he took a 'gap year' – a one-year break from study. He went to Belize with the British Army, worked on a farm in the UK and helped a charity in Chile. There he taught English and did ordinary things like cooking and cleaning for the first time!



After his gap year, William chose to study History of Art at the University of St Andrews in Scotland. Later, he changed his course but while he was studying History of Art he met his future wife – Kate Middleton. At first they were just good friends, and then they became boyfriend and girlfriend.

Kate comes from an ordinary family. Her parents didn't begin their lives as rich people. They worked hard and started their own business. Kate and William had a happy time together at St Andrews. Luckily the media agreed to stay away from William while he was studying. Because of this the relationship between William and Kate could grow easily. They didn't have photographers with them all the time.



After university William started army training and then the media started following him and Kate more often. This was hard for Kate and she stopped seeing William for a short time. But soon they were back together again and nearly two years later, on April 29th 2011, they got married at Westminster Abbey.

It was a wonderful day for William and Kate, for the Royal Family and for everyone who watched it in London or on television. Harry was proud to be William's best man*. It was a different event from Diana and Charles' wedding twenty-nine years before. Diana was a beautiful but shy bride. Kate was beautiful but she also had a strong, quiet confidence. She and William seemed very relaxed together. They smiled, laughed and joked a lot after the ceremony. Their kiss at Buckingham Palace was on the front page of newspapers around the world!



The Queen gave William and Kate the new royal names of 'Duke and Duchess of Cambridge' and their marriage was a new beginning for the Royal Family. William now has an important and exciting job. He flies helicopters that find and save people at sea or on land. But he and Kate also spend a lot of time on royal visits. People love the new Duke and Duchess of Cambridge and their relaxed way of talking to the media. Their modern lives are part of the changing traditions of Britain's Royal Family.

In the past the monarch used a sword and said the words: Arise Sir* ...! The Queen still uses a sword but she doesn't say the famous words now! And women can become knights too. They are called 'Dame'.

In our modern world, famous people like film stars, scientists, or business leaders can become knights too. They often get honours for a long life of good work or for their charity work. Famous knights include Dame Judi Dench, Sir Paul McCartney and Sir Bill Gates.
